Exciting times ahead for Hadley & Leegomery Methodist Church

During the Circuit Meeting on 12th March 2025, the Trustees of Hadley Methodist Church requested help from the Circuit to find a suitable other local church to merge with, to create a single group of managing trustees and asked the CLT to oversee the process.

Leegomery Methodist Church was open to the idea.

Both Church Councils have now met and, using Standing Order SO605a, have passed resolutions to merge the trusts of both churches in order to create a new church. This means that from 31 August 2025, Hadley Methodist Church and Leegomery Methodist Church shall cease to exist and on 1 September 2025 the Hadley & Leegomery Methodist Church shall come into being.

The individual assets and liabilities of Hadley Methodist Church and Leegomery Methodist Church shall become the assets and liabilities of the new Hadley & Leegomery Methodist Church.

As a separate resolution, Hadley Methodist Church Council decided that from 31 August 2025, they would no longer worship at Hadley Community Centre, but shall join in worship with the congregation currently known as Leegomery Methodist Church.

This is a new and exciting opportunity for the mission and presence of the Methodist Church in Hadley & Leegomery. Please celebrate this new venture and the opportunities that it generates.

The provision of the Standing Order used means that the decision is effected by the resolutions of both groups of managing trustees (Church Councils) and no further permissions are required.

We will be holding a **Worship Leaders' Introduction and Refresher course** at <u>Cartway</u> on <u>Friday afternoons</u> in the autumn, <u>2-3:30pm</u>. These sessions will use *some* of the WL training resources but we will *not be covering the whole course*.

* No previous experience or materials needed... just a willingness to think, be open and engage.

- <u>5th September</u> Delving into the Bible: What is it? Who wrote it and when? How do we interpret it? How do we best read the Bible aloud in worship? How far do we trust the authority of the Bible?
- <u>19th September</u> Exegesis: How do we dive deeper into a Bible passage? What questions do we ask and why is this important?
- <u>3rd October</u> God talk: names, metaphors and language for God. A multisensory approach and meeting God in our actions.
- <u>17th October</u> Trinitarian God and the creeds: What are the creeds and how can we express the nature of God meaningfully in our worship?
- <u>31st October</u> Church: What is church and what is our calling? What does it mean to be Methodist and part of a wider Connexion?
- <u>14th November</u> Worship: How has worship developed over time? Different expressions and patterns of worship. Inclusivity.
- <u>28th November</u> Resources: Getting the most out of our hymn book and the lectionary, ways to present scripture, how music and art might enhance worship, writing prayers and alternatives to a sermon.

Eco News from the Telford Circuit

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it."

Genesis 2:15



I wonder, do you use the space outside your church? What does it say about you as God's family and about the abundant Creator you worship?

The spaces outside our circuit churches range from mature gardens to wild patches, carparks or just a bit of pavement, but we all have the potential to do something... even if it is just a window box. If you have children or young people at your church this might be a great way to engage them with caring for God's beautiful creation and perhaps to give them some responsibility within your church family, as they do at Dunwell Ketley. Using your outside space has also proved to be a great way to engage with your neighbours in the community.

From the Eco Church 'Land and Nature' survey, here are some questions to get you thinking about what might be possible...

Our church is intentional about leaving 'untidy' areas during the autumn/winter that support over-wintering wildlife: dead flowers, seed heads / wildflower containers left 'untidy' / leaf piles, branches

Our church supports wildlife-friendly (e.g. for birds, butterflies etc) planting on our land by: planting in containers / planting in window boxes / creating a roof garden or vertical garden

Our church actively encourages people to access and enjoy our land by providing: nature display boards / benches or seats / a wildlife trail / a labyrinth / adaptations to improve accessibility

NAAMAN AND T'MUCKY BROOK 2 Kings 5:1-15

There was once a prophet in Israel, Whose miracles brought him great fame, Including the one I shall shortly relate; Elisha were this prophet's name.

'Twere a period when Israel and Syria Were allus at war with each other; And some Syrian soldiers had took a young lass And snatched her away from her mother.

To be took from her home and her country Caused the young lass a great deal of grief,

But she soon became personal skivvy To t'wife of Commander-in-Chief.

Now this was a general called Naaman -A right gradely chap he's depicted -But Naaman were struck with an awful complaint; With leprosy he were afflicted.

He'd tried every doctor in t'country (And he were a man of some wealth), But none of the quacks could offer a cure, Either private or national health.

Then the lass as was maid to his missus Said, "He'll never get cured in this area; He should get in his chariot and go, and consult The prophet as lives in Samaria".

Naaman heard this and went and told t' king, In his palace in t' capital city; He said, "Thee get off to yon Israelite king; I'll write thee a personal chitty". So Naaman took gifts of silver and gold And some Savile Row suits and a letter Which said, "This here's my C. in C., Naaman. He's a leper - I want him made better".

Now, news of this came to Elisha, And he wrote to the king with some feeling; "Don't get in a sweat - just send him to me, And I'll show them who knows about healing".

So Naaman went off in his chariot, And arrived at Elisha's front door; And when t' prophet's servant answered his knock He explained to him what he'd come for.

Elisha was told who were calling. But he just left him stood in the hall; He said, "tell him to jump in the river, And duck under seven times an' all".

When Naaman received this instruction, With hot indignation he shook; He said, "What! Have I come all this distance Just to bathe in this here mucky brook?"

"He could have got up off his backside, And called on his god for a cure; Why, we've far better rivers in Syria Than this Jordan, I'll tell you for sure".

With these words he jumped in his chariot, And were going to drive off in a huff; But his henchmen said, "Don't be too hasty -What he's asking is easy enough".

"If he'd told you to do summat tricky, You'd 'a' done it wi never a thowt; Why don't you jump into the river and see If you're cured when you get yourself out?"

So Naaman reined in his horse then, For he saw their suggestion made sense; Though he felt it inflicted a wound on his pride, The benefit could be immense.

He went down and bathed in the Jordan, Whose waters he thought so inferior; And when he came out his skin were as soft And as smooth as a baby's posterior. And if you long to turn back the pages, And recover that newly-born look, You must wash off all pride in humility's tide; Think on Naaman and yon mucky brook.

Well Naaman was so overjoyed That he no longer suffered so badly, Two bags of silver he gave away, And, now a changed man, he gave gladly.


Gehazi knew well that he shouldn't have done it So he hid away all of his stash, But Elisha saw through it and made for to tell That he'd always be cursed with a rash.



Welcome to the Launch Service and Welcome for the new Chair of District!



The President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference call on the UK Government to recognise Palestine as an Independent State

From the Revd Richard Andrew and Matthew Forsyth, President and Vice-President of the Conference.

We have been appalled and horrified by the pictures and first-hand witness accounts of the dire situation in Gaza, particularly around access to food for those existing there.

No-one could fail to be moved by the images of emaciated children and we have a moral duty to heed and act on the warnings from countless aid agencies of mass starvation and malnutrition.

We welcome the pause in military activity, but this is not enough. Red lines in international law have been crossed by the Israeli Government and they and Hamas must provide explicit acceptance of the right to peace, security and prosperity for all Israelis and Palestinians.

The Methodist Conference this year accepted a memorial (motion) from the Wolverhampton and Shrewsbury District Synod asking the Conference to write to the UK government urging it to recognise the independent state of Palestine, a position the Methodist Church has long held.

The motion stated that over the last twelve months, "the Israeli government has accelerated the seizure and annexation of Palestinian land, in violation of international law. This has implications not only for Palestinian people in the West Bank and Gaza who are forcibly displaced but also for any prospect of a future peace."

The time is now right for the Government to take decisive action to recognise the state of Palestine, its right to self-determination, and to ensure safety for all its citizens across the West Bank and we urge them to do this without delay.

Creator God,
you breathed life into this world and
us all. We long for an end to suffering in
Gaza and pray for freedom for all your
creation.

Give to those in authority wisdom to act decisively for the good of all, so that we may see a just and peaceful resolution in Gaza, the West Bank and Israel

In the name of the Prince of Peace, Amen.

We ask the Methodist people to continue to pray for those caught up in the violence in Gaza who don't know where their next meal is coming from. We also continue to pray for those in the West Bank who are living in constant fear of indiscriminate border closures and settler violence against them.




<u>Wolverhampton & Shrewsbury District Chair's Travels</u> - Rev Rachel Parkinson - Taken from her Facebook Page on 27th July 2025.

On my first Sunday practically (though not yet technically) Without Appointment, I joined the protective presence outside the Britannia Hotel in Wolverhampton. After the protests in Epping and Norwich this weekend outside hotels being used as accommodation for asylum seekers, it had been announced that there would be a similar protest at midday today in Wolverhampton.

The protective presence began at 11am and I found common cause with a wide range of Wulfrunians who had gathered. In the end only a couple of people seemed to appear for the protest. Was it because they'd heard about the counter protest, or was there never the momentum in the first place?

Difficult to say. But one of the things I love about Wolverhampton is that to a large extent, it's a city at ease with itself and its highly diverse population. That



seems to offer a degree of protection against those who seek to stir up unrest. This doesn't happen by accident - it's a result of the hard work of many individuals and groups over decades. It's been my privilege to work with some of them.

In a tweet advertising the protest one person put that it was wrong that hotels are being "influxed by immigrants whilst many many natives are sleeping on the streets". It's absolutely right that there's a housing and homelessness crisis affecting the UK and this certainly affects Wolverhampton. I passed a number of shop doorways housing rough sleepers on the high street. If you want to know what we should be urging politicians to do in response there's a good summary by Crisis here (tip: it doesn't feature asylum seekers and hotels!). https://www.crisis.org.uk/.../key.../housing/housing-supply/

Cartway, Bridgnorth has 3 bibles study groups.


Shambles Group meet on 2nd Monday of the month at 10:30am


